### 1 CONFIRMATION OF QUORUM

1.1 With 38 members present, President Prof Ho Teck Hua verified and declared the quorum to begin the meeting.

### 2 SECRETARY'S REPORT

- 2.1 The Secretary's Report (attached in Annex A) was presented to the attendees for information.
- 2.2 Prof Aaron Thean shared that there are 151 Fellows currently. He highlighted slight demographic shifts in terms of age, gender and sector representation. New Fellows were also welcomed, including 10 from institutes of higher learning, 3 from industry, and 2 from the public sector.
- 2.3 The meeting noted the revisions to fellowship criteria, awards and honours received by various Fellows, and the release of the Academy's 10<sup>th</sup> newsletter in June 2023.
- 2.4 Prof Ho Teck Hua solicited comments on the Secretary's Report. Fellows endorsed the Secretary's Report without any amendment.

### 3 TREASURER'S REPORT

- 3.1 The Treasurer's Report on the Academy's financial status for the year ending 31 December 2022 (attached in Annex B) was presented to the attendees.
- 3.2 Prof Liu Bin highlighted the need for the Academy to have more activities and the importance of securing more donations to increase the funds available for activities such as outreach efforts.
- 3.3 Prof Ho Teck Hua shared that the Academy is working towards getting funding from the National Research Foundation (NRF). Despite a previous unsuccessful attempt,



he plans to approach NRF again, seeking \$200K to \$250K annually. This funding could support outreach activities and the commissioning of a white paper.

- The Fellows' agreed that having more activities is important. They also suggested increasing the visibility of the Academy by increasing the frequency of newsletters, promoting printed copies for distribution among Fellows and visitors, sending newsletters to high schools, and incorporating talks during high school outreach programmes.
- 3.5 Prof Ho Teck Hua informed the attendees about the Academy's application to the International Council of Academies of Engineering and Technological Sciences (CAETS), which includes representation from countries such as the USA, China, France, and Germany. The annual membership fee is around USD2,000. He shared that a visit by CAETS representatives is expected this year and highlighted the importance to the Academy of having more activities in anticipation of joining such a major, global organisation.
- 3.6 Prof Liu Bin added that a presentation on the Academy will be given to CAETS, which has expressed its interest in engaging with the leadership committee. She encouraged Fellows to provide inputs on activities and stories for the presentation and meeting.
- 3.7 Prof Aaron Thean pointed out that if there are any past Fellows projects or relevant information, Fellows can share these details for the presentation to CAETS.
- In the discussion, the idea of featuring papers authored by Fellows as a way to showcase the Academy's work, was raised.
- 3.9 It was also highlighted that the CAETS membership would not only open opportunities for collaborations with



international organisations but also generate momentum for new activities.

- 3.10 Additionally, Prof Lee Der-Horng mentioned the prospect of a visit by the Chinese Academy of Engineering, potentially fostering collaborations. Prof Ho Teck Hua replied that the Academy is happy to host them.
- 3.11 Prof Ho Teck Hua solicited comments on the Treasurer's Report. Fellows endorsed the Treasurer's Report without any amendment.

### 4 CHANGES IN CONSTITUTION

- 4.1 Changes to the Constitution (attached in Annex C) were presented to the attendees for approval.
- 4.2 Prof Aaron Thean clarified that although the latest version of the Constitution was approved in previous AGMs, the Registry of Societies (RoS) has not been updated on these changes. Therefore, there is a need to ensure that the Academy's latest constitution is updated with RoS.
- 4.3 Prof Ho Teck Hua solicited comments on the changes to the Constitution. Fellows endorsed the changes without any amendment.

### 5 ELECTION OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEMBERS

Prof Aaron Thean shared that he would be stepping down and Prof Guo Yongxin from NUS would be replacing him as Secretary. Mr Adriel Chang from NUS will be replacing Ms Ong Hui Tian as Secretariat. Prof Thean also welcomed Prof Lim Khiang Wee from SIT and Prof Phoon Kok Kwang from SUTD as new members of the ExCo. The following table shows the composition of the new ExCo:

5.2 Prof Ho Teck Hua solicited comments on the composition of the new ExCo. Fellows endorsed the new ExCo member composition without any amendment.

### 6 ANY OTHER BUSINESS

- With regard to the discussion on the CAETS application, refer to points 3.5 to 3.10.
- 6.2 Prof Ho Teck Hua raised a question for discussion regarding the Academy's response to a scenario in which a Fellow is



requested to leave due to ethical or behavioural concerns by other institutions.

6.3 In the discussion, the potential inclusion of a rule within the Secretariat Constitution to respond to such a scenario, was raised. While some members expressed support for its inclusion, others voiced concerns about potential constraints it might impose on the Academy. Alternately, suggestions were made to incorporate the rule while maintaining the flexibility to not enforce it strictly. However, concerns were raised about potential negative perceptions if the Academy did not follow through. Some members also advocated for a mild and general inclusion in the Constitution, without delving into specific procedural aspects. It was suggested that the Academy refer to the Institution of Engineers, Singapore's (IES) clause on termination, and include similar language in the Constitution, along with the changes mentioned in points 4.1 and 4.2.

- 6.4 The consensus was that the Academy should have the capacity to request Fellows to leave. It was also suggested that Fellows would likely act sensibly in such circumstances and voluntarily leave.
- 6.5 Prof Ho Teck Hua highlighted the issue regarding Fellows who have relocated to other countries and become nonparticipatory in meetings. This raised the question of whether these Fellows should retain the right to vote, especially in situations where their votes could alter the majority in critical matters.
- 6.6 In the discussion, the suggestion of Fellows having attended Secretariat a minimum number of meetings in order to maintain voting eligibility, was raised. It was also acknowledged that taking part in meetings is a general challenge faced by Fellows on overseas fellowships due to travel and differences in time zones.



- 6.7 Ultimately, there was an overall consensus on maintaining the status quo. Members were comfortable with Fellows who are overseas, participating in critical decisions through voting.
- 6.8 Prof Ho Teck Hua shared the need for the Academy to (1) identify target customers, (2) make engineering education attractive through outreach (an area that MOE is keen to support), and (3) get international exposure to explore best practices and foster mutual learning. He added that the focus at present can be on enhancing the appeal of engineering education, an area in which the Academy can collaborate with IES.
- 6.9 During the discussion, members put forward several suggestions for the Academy's growth. These include organising flagship forums and conferences that may be company-sponsored to generate profit and enhance visibility, collaborating with IES on a joint forum, and establishing flagship journals.
- 6.10 Further ideas include reaching out to high school teachers for collaboration, encouraging Fellows to highlight the Academy's mission on their CVs, and providing judges for the World Robot Olympiad. The meeting also noted the importance of expanding the Academy's activities incrementally while ensuring sufficient resources are allocated.
- 6.11 Prof Ho Teck Hua pointed out a decline in the quality of students pursuing engineering studies in recent years. He added that MOE has started awarding scholarships to high school students as a new approach to attract them to engineering. He indicated that the Academy could seek support from MOE and reiterated the Academy's aim to secure \$200K to \$250K from NRF to fulfil the three objectives mentioned earlier.



- In the discussion, it was highlighted that decision makers often focus too much on domain-specific work in engineering. The Academy's role in broadening the public's understanding of engineering as a whole and introducing new viewpoints on high-quality research was acknowledged. Furthermore, the attendees noted that NRF conducts studies on foundational research capabilities to guide national focus areas. Collaborating with NRF in this endeavour could help to amplify the Academy's activities.
- 6.13 Prof Ho Teck Hua added that the Academy will play a role in the judging team for the President's Technology Award. He also suggested a simpler approach to public and governmental engagement, with Fellows giving talks and openly stating their affiliation with the Academy to promote it effectively. Additionally, he proposed that the Academy create white papers and policy documents for government consideration, showcasing its value and enhancing its brand. He also suggested the possibility of Fellows being involved in government projects, such as participating in advisory boards, which would enable them to contribute to vital initiatives.
- Or Zhou Yingxin highlighted that the Academy's name can be Dr Zhou listed as a supporting organisation for the 18<sup>th</sup> Conference of the Associated Research Centers for the Urban Underground Space. He clarified that there are no financial obligations for supporting organisations. Prof Ho Teck Hua welcomed this idea and requested that Dr Zhou provide details on this potential engagement for approval.

### 7 CLOSING OF THE MEETING

7.1 There being no other business, the meeting ended at 4.02pm.

### **Activities**

### Change in Fellowship Criteria

Since 2012, the academy has greatly expanded its circle of fellows. We now have 147 eminent fellows, who have made significant contributions to engineering.

To maintain the quality of fellows, the SAEng executive committee has revised the assessment criteria and process of accepting fellowship nominations. These changes will help the academy to attract fellows with varied engineering skillsets, which will lead to new perspectives being shared and the creation of more engineering innovations and achievements in the future.

The revisions, which are effective immediately, are detailed below:

These notes form an integral part of and should be read in conjunction with the accompanying financial statements.

### 1. General

Academy of Engineering, Singapore (the "Association") is domiciled and registered in Singapore with its place of business and registered office address at 70 Bukit Tinggi Road, C/O Association of Engineering, Singapore 289758. It is registered as a Society under the Societies Act, Chapter 311 in Singapore on 16 June 2011. It is an approved charitable organisation under the Charities Act, Chapter 37, with effect from 15 November 2012 and its income is exempted from income tax subject to compliance with certain provisions of the Singapore Income Tax Act, Chapter 134.

The principal activities of the Association are to promote, assist, and coordinate the activities to advance and promote excellence in Engineering in Singapore. There have been no significant changes in the nature of these activities during the financial year.

The Association was granted the Institute of Public Character (IPC) status and is qualified to issue tax deductible receipts for outright donations designated for its engineering related programmes as stated in its objects of Constitution. This status was granted from 14 February 2013 to 13 February 2015. The Association's IPC was not renewed since its expiry.

The financial statements are presented in Singapore dollar ("S\$"), which is the Association's functional currency. All financial information presented are denominated in Singapore dollar unless otherwise stated.

### 2.2 Adoption of new and amended standards and interpretations

The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous financial year except in the current financial year, the Association has adopted all the new and amended standards which are relevant to the Association and are effective for annual financial periods beginning on or after 1 January 2022. The adoption of this standards did not have any material effect on the financial performance or position of the Association.

### 2.4 Financial instruments

### (a) Financial assets

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets are recognised when, and only when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instruments.

At initial recognition, the Association measures a financial asset at its fair value plus, in the case of a financial asset not at fair value through profit or loss ("FVPL"), transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Transaction costs of financial assets carried at FVPL are expensed in profit or loss.

Financial assets are recognised when, and only when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instruments.

At initial recognition, the Association measures a financial asset at its fair value plus, in the case of a financial asset not at fair value through profit or loss ("FVPL"), transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Transaction costs of financial assets carried at FVPL are expensed in profit or loss.

### Subsequent measurement

Subsequent measurement of debt instruments depends on the Association's business model for managing the asset and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the asset. The three measurement categories for classification of debt instruments are amortised cost, fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI) and FVPL. The Association only has debt instruments at amortised cost.

Financial assets that are held for the collection of contractual cash flows where those cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest are measured at amortised cost. Financial assets comprise of bank balances, are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less impairment. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the assets are derecognised or impaired, and through amortisation process.

### Derecognition

A financial asset is derecognised where the contractual right to receive cash flows from the asset has expired. On derecognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between the carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and any cumulative gain or loss that had been recognised in other comprehensive income for debt instruments is recognised in profit or loss.

### 2. Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

### 2.4 Financial instruments (continued)

### (b) Financial liabilities

### Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are recognised when, and only when, the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument. The Association determines the classification of its financial liabilities at initial recognition.

All financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value plus in the case of financial liabilities not at FVPL, directly attributable transaction costs.

### Subsequent measurement

After initial recognition, financial liabilities that are not carried at FVPL are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Gains and losses are recognised in profit or loss when the liabilities are derecognised, and through the amortisation process.

### Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognised when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. On derecognition, the difference between the carrying amounts and the consideration paid is recognised in profit or loss.

### (c) Offsetting of financial instruments

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported on the statement of financial position when there is a legally enforceable right to offset and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

### 2.5 Impairment of financial assets

The Association recognises an allowance for expected credit losses (ECLs) for all debt instruments not held at FVPL. ECLs are based on the difference between the contractual cash flows due in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the Association expects to receive, discounted at an approximation of the original effective interest rate. The expected cash flows will include cash flows from the sale of collateral held or other credit enhancements that are integral to the contractual terms.

ECLs are recognised in two stages. For credit exposures for which there has not been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, ECLs are provided for credit losses that result from default events that are possible within the next 12-months (a 12-month ECL). For those credit exposures for which there has been a significant increase in credit risk since initial recognition, a loss allowance is recognised for credit losses expected over the remaining life of the exposure, irrespective of timing of the default (a lifetime ECL).

### 2. Summary of significant accounting policies (continued)

### 2.6 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and the amount of the obligation can be estimated reliably.

Provisions are reviewed at the end of each reporting period and adjusted to reflect the current best estimate. If it is no longer probable that an outflow of economic resources will be required to settle the obligation, the provision is reversed. If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are discounted using a current pre-tax rate that reflects, where appropriate, the risks specific to the liability. When discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognised as a finance cost.

### 2.7 Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured based on the consideration to which the Association expects to be entitled in exchange for transferring promised goods or services to a customer, excluding amounts collected on behalf of third parties.

Revenue is recognised when the Association satisfies a performance obligation by transferring a promised good or service to the customer, which is when the customer obtains control of the good or service. A performance obligation may be satisfied at a point in time or over time. The amount of revenue recognised is the amount allocated to the satisfied performance obligation.

### Donation income

Donation income is recognised on a receipt basis or collection basis.

### 4. Financial risk management

The Association's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks from its operations. The key is credit risk and liquidity risk. The Association's overall risk management objective is to focus on the unpredictability of financial markets and seeks to minimise potential adverse effects on the financial performance of the Association. The Association does not have a formal risk management policies and guidelines.

### (a) Credit risk

The Association has no significant concentrations of credit risk. Cash is placed with established financial institutions. The maximum exposure to credit risk is represented by the carrying amount of each financial assets in the statement of financial position.

The Association manages credit loss based on Expected Credit Loss ("ECL") model.

The Council Members assess that there are no material ECL on bank balances.

### (b) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk refers to the risk that the Association will encounter difficulties in meeting its short-term obligations due to shortage of funds. The Association's exposure to liquidity risk arises primarily from mismatches of the maturities of financial assets and liabilities. It is managed by matching the payment and receipt cycles.

The Association manages its liquidity risk and maintaining an adequate level of bank balances deemed adequate by the Council Members to finance its activities and to mitigate the effects of fluctuations in cash flows. At the statement of financial position date, asset held by the Association for managing liquidity risk included bank balances.

### 5. Fair values

The carrying amount of financial assets and financial liabilities are recorded in the financial statements at their approximate fair values, determined in accordance with the accounting policies disclosed in Note 2 to the financial statement.

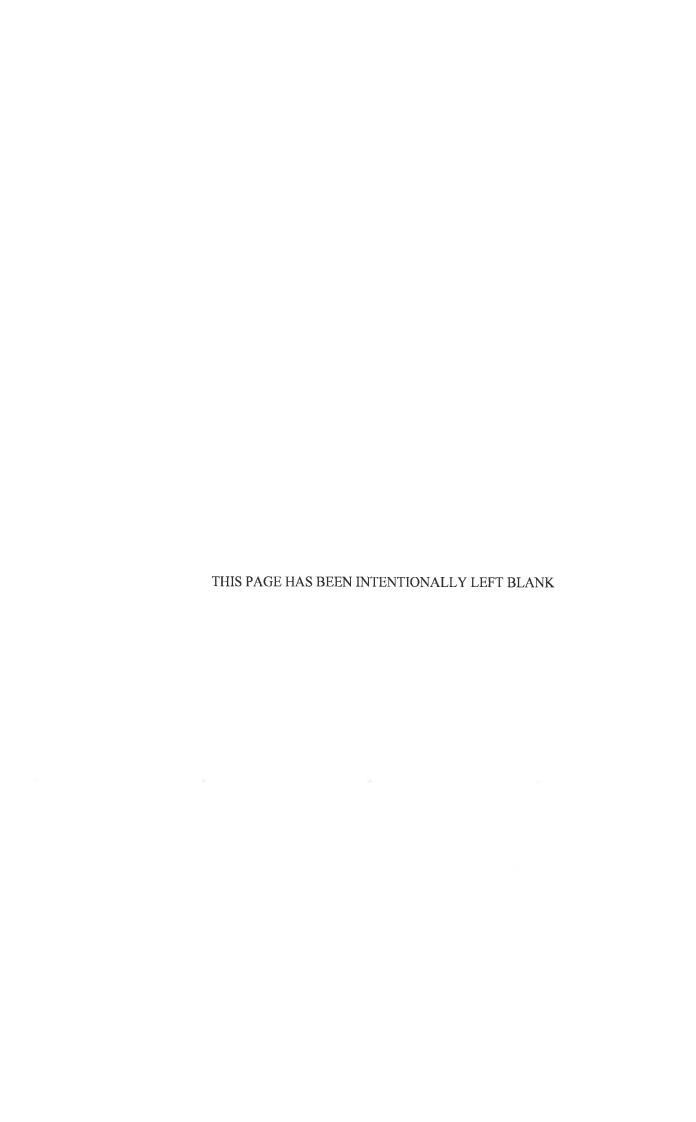
